Dancing is, of course, the excuse it gives to travel to otherwise ruinously expensive cities, like New York and Washington...


As part of the Chain Down the Northeast sequence, Times Squares of NY hosted a dance on Friday, June 24, featuring one of our favourites, Anne Uebelacker. About a hundred square dancers were present, most having flown in for the Gay Games and the 25th anniversary of Stonewall, with representation from all levels up to Challenge, and from most clubs across the continent. Because of the generally high level of expertise, Anne called some of the hottest Mainstream I've ever danced - a good reminder that it's not necessary to keep advancing through the programs to have exciting dancing.

Triangle Squares had a delegate to the Gay Games, with one of our Advanced dancers, Sandy, entered in the marathon. Although illness prevented Sandy from finishing, we extend to her our heartiest congratulations on her participation and lots of gold-medal-quality hugs.

The March on Sunaay, June 26, had either fewer than 100 thousand or more than a million, depending on whose estimate you believe. It began with Raise the Rainbow (not a bad name for a square dance call), a mile-long rainbow flag carried up 1st Avenue, with one of the carriers being Paul Waters, our popular fly-in caller last year. I was marching with a doctor friend in the medical contingent ("2-4-6-8, can we check your prostate"), then dropped out to watch the other groups go by. Two visually spectacular hours later, the Times Squares came along, and I joined in as we square danced our way along 59th Street and into Central Park. Times Squares club caller Nick Manocchio did the honours.

The next day, I drove to Washington with two other callers, Stan More of New York, and Kevin Cassidy, founder of Citadel Squares in Halifax, and soon-to-be founder of a club in London, Ontario (yay, Kevin). Callers' School is a three-day series of workshops which takes place just before conventions, and is a highly recommended experience, even for those who do not wish to be callers, as it gives a better appreciation for what happens on the other side of the mike. This schools was divided into three levels of experience, and once again, Triangle Squares was well represented, with Andy Chong, Dan Cooperstock, and myself in attendance. We had workshops in voice training from an opera singer and trained vocal coach who is experienced at working with square dance callers, practise writing choreographic patterns, and drill in sight calling. The most useful features are critiques from professionals Anne Uebelacker, Mike Jacobs, and Betsy Gotta.

The Convention came next, but of course you either know or have heard all about that - just ask any of the bubbly, enthusiastic square dancers around you.

From the IAGSDC™ Representative

The executive boards of the International Gay Square Association of (IAGSDC™), Dance Clubs consisting of representatives and alternates from each club, met at the annual convention in

Washington. While most of the decisions were also announced at the general business meeting, here is a summary for those who were not there.

The Association's finances have improved since the special assessment last year. Along with a reduction in spending, the IAGSDC™ anticipates a \$600 deficit in 1994 and 1995, which it can now afford.

Five new full member clubs were admitted: Lismore Scooters of East Balina, NSW, Australia, Ohio City Squares of Cleveland, Ohio (after some debate), Royalty Squares of Chino, California, Rainbow Wranglers of Eugene, Oregon, and MC² of Boyd, Maryland (which dances in a community centre run by a Metropolitan Community Church).

While the IAGSDC™ has cut down somewhat in its straight advertising, it has budgeted more money for assisting in the formation of new clubs, like seeding advertising in local papers. It is also advertising in various general gay magazines and newspapers.

The Seattle convention reported a record 1,138 registrants, and on an income of some \$160,000, had a profit of \$1,270, split between the local clubs and charities. (The Washington convention then broke this attendance record with 1,158 registrants.)

A committee that investigated whether the IAGSDC™ should be involved in the Advanced and Challenge fly-in which currently rotates around various west coast cities, suggested leaving things as they are: non-interference unless required.

The IAGSDC™ Treasurer in the future will have to be bonded.

A motion to change the dues structure back to a flat fee per club was defeated, after some debate.

A proposal for Association-wide liability insurance was defeated, since it would be mandatory for all US and Canadian clubs to participate at a cost of \$1.50 per member. The Treasurer will seek an optional-participation policy.



A resolution was passed asking member clubs to join their local square dance association. (Triangle Squares is indirectly represented with the Toronto & District Association by myself.)

An experimental association-wide mailing system will be set up. We will be able to mail newsletters, flyers, etc. to a single location, which will repackage and redirect them to all member clubs at a lower cost than mailing them ourselves.

A committee will be setup up to advise future convention committees. The first year's work of this committee is to write its mandate and report back next year.

The terms of the officers were doubled to two years, with staggered elections. Starting this year, the President and Treasurer will serve two years; starting next year, the Vice President and Secretary will serve two years.

A new level of non-voting membership was created for non-dance organizations, with a fixed fee. Specifically this includes the Gay Callers Association and convention organizing committees (like Tip the Cow Inc.).

The Association has trademarked a couple of logos, and will charge future conventions 15% of their profits for their use (waived, if there is no profit). This allows the Association to get some profit out of the conventions, which previously was impossible due to legal restrictions.

The 1995 convention will be held in Chicago on the Memorial Day Weekend, while 1996 will be held in San Francisco the weekend after Pride Day. Neon Squares of Las Vegas was the only bidder for 1997, and despite having only 12 members, has various other clubs willing to assist on-site, so were ratified for July 10th-12th at the Sands Convention Centre. Portland OR was the only bidder for 1998, Time Squares of New York and Paul Waters organizing various Los Angeles clubs are interested in 1999. Baltimore is interested in 2000, and Vancouver for 2001.

Finally, Bob Young of Time Squares, New York was re-elected Chair, Randy Clark of various California clubs was elected Vice-Chair, John Foulds of Desert Valley Squares, Phoenix was re-elected Secretary, and Darrell Ertzberger remains Treasurer.
