DANCING

The current dance season ends June 22 for the Wednesday night class and June 23 for the Thursday night class. We will be holding two club nights this summer, July 14th and August 18th. The July dance will be called by Joe Uebelacker, while the August club night will feature Tim Crawford. Both of these dances will be at the 519.

We have the 519 every Thursday through July and August, and there is the possibility that casual dancing or workshops could be arranged if anyone (including a caller) is interested. These dances don't necessarily even have to be on a Thursday, depending on the availability of space. You are urged to speak to Chris Homer if you are interested in this type of activity.

We have tentatively made up the club schedule for the fall season. The Board of Education has advised us that we were successful in obtaining a permit for Jesse Ketchum school as well as the Church Street School on Wednesday nights. We are therefore considering utilizing the dividing wall at Jesse Ketchum to split the gym into two spaces, holding the Basic/Mainstream class in one half of the gym, and alternating A2 dancing with the demo team in the other half. Thursday nights we will likely continue to dance in the 519, with the A1 class from 7:00 to 8:30, and Plus class from 8:30 to 10:00.

Dancing will begin on September 7th for the Wednesday classes, and September 8th for the Thursday classes.



VESTS

The club has utilized most of the John Rutledge bequest to purchase club vests, that we plan to debut at the Washington convention. The vests will remain the property of the club, and will be available for use by any club member dancing at other fly-ins or any other square dance event, such as dancing at the CNE or the Hamilton convention next year.

The vests are black and white with silver buttons, and we would therefore like to make the club "uniform", the vest accompanied with black pants, a white shirt, and a silver bolo tie.

The vests will be available in Washington from Richard and Les. If you have an occasion where you would like to use one of the club vests after that date, you should speak to one of the steering committee, who will be happy to arrange it for you.


