It overlooks the pool below so you can check out the Speedos. Unfortunately, the attached kitchen is leased to an outside caterer so we do not have access to a stove or oven. So in planning what to bring, you might consider something that could be served cool or lukewarm, or if hot, bring it insulated directly from your oven. For "absolutely-must-be-hot" things, the pot-luck chair, Bob Hails, might be able to arrange for warming trays or chaffing dishes or a microwave. Bob will be contacting people closer to the 27th of May. There is ample public parking across the street for those coming by car; the College subway station is a short two blocks away; and the village is close by.

All level dancing will take place at Jessie Ketchum School, and the Sunday Brunch will be at W.C. Fields Restaurant in Yorkville, at 50 Cumberland Street.
